

MARKET ACCESS GUIDELINES



European Fisheries Market 2012

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Market Access refers the openness of particular markets to foreign products and services with compliance to the conditions of tariff and non-tariff measures for the entry of specific goods into the specific markets.

1. Non Tariff Barriers

a. Consumer Health and Safety management

- o Comply with HACCP
- Comply with CITES-legislation
- o Comply with GlobalGAP applied for cultivated fishery products
- o Phytosanitary inspection
- Maximum residue levels (MRLs) in food (health and safety)
- o Rules on the use of contaminants in food (health and safety)

b. Retail chain/ supply chain management

- GMP (good management practices)
- Availability of complete information on the products for the rtailer/wholeseller/end user
- o Traceability of available information
- Monitoring production process and maintaining the quality control over the every step in the supply chain.

c. Product Quality Management

- Comply with required quality standards (ISO, HAACCP, Globalgap)
- Traceability- maintaining a good recording system
- Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP), Standard Sanitation Operational Procedures (SSOP)
- Sensory evaluation of raw material and final product to compare and see how this is related to processing and quality parameters recorded in the quality system. (QIM)

d. Environmental Management

- To_govern access to fishing zones and resources and the sustainable pursuit of fishing activities
- o Adopting recovery plans for stocks outside safe biological limits;
- o Adopting management plans to maintain stocks within safe biological limits;
- Limiting catches;

- Limiting type of vessels authorised to fish;
- o Adopting technical measures to promote more selective fishing
- An analysis of the essential characteristics of water. (physical and chemical features, types of habitat, animal and plant populations, etc.);
- An analysis of the main impacts and pressures, particularly as a result of human activities which affect the characteristics of these waters (contamination by Toxic products, eutrophication, smothering or sealing of habitats by construction work, introduction of non-indigenous species, physical damage caused by ship anchors, etc.);
- Implementing an economic and social conrol over the use of these waters

e. Social Accountability and Fair trade Management

- Comply with SA8000, or Social Accountability 8000, Occupational health and safety OHAS 18001,ILO conventions and labour conditions (ILO) applied for
 - Child labor
 - Freedom of Association
 - Non discrimination
 - Wages and benefits
 - Working hours
 - Forced labor and discipline practices
 - Abuse and harassment
 - Health and safety
 - Environment
 - Subcontracting practices
- Comply with Fair-trade <u>standards</u>. One set of standards applies to smallholders that are working together in co-operatives or other organizations with a democratic structure. The other set applies to workers, whose employers pay decent wages, guarantee the right to join trade unions, ensure health and safety standards and provide adequate housing where relevant.

f. Special requirements of buyers (optional)

Comply with the buyers' requirements on packaging, labeling, pricing, delivering and etc.

b. Quotas

The application of a reduced tariff rate for a specific quantity of imported goods and a higher tariff for imports above this quantity is known as an import tariff quota. A tariff quota has two parts, the Inside Tariff Quota Rate and the Outside Tariff Quota Rate.

Considering fishery products exports there's no quota applied for that sector.
